## Phase-based preparation for 2025-26

A phase-based plan avoids burnout because you do not treat every month like the last month. Below is a practical structure that many high scorers follow, adjusted to a realistic student timetable.

### Phase 1: Coverage with small tests

As you finish each unit, solve 15 to 25 marks worth of questions from that topic. The goal is not speed yet; it is accuracy and correct format. If you consistently struggle to start answers, create

brief outlines before writing full responses. This builds the habit of organizing thoughts quickly.

### **Phase 2: Mixed practice for retention**

When 60 to 70 percent of the syllabus is done, shift to mixed sets. Mixing topics forces the brain to retrieve information rather than recognize it, which improves retention. At this stage, use marking guidelines to check whether your points match what evaluators typically reward: clear steps, correct terms, and relevant examples.

### **Phase 3: Full-length timing and refinement**

In the final phase, full papers are essential. The purpose is to learn pacing: how long to spend on each section and how to protect time for high-scoring questions. After each paper, rewrite only the answers you lost marks in. This keeps revision focused and prevents endless re-reading.

### **Learning from Class 10 patterns without feeling behind**

It may sound surprising, but reviewing a CBSE sample paper class 10 can help Class 12 students too. Class 10 papers make the basics visible: reading questions carefully, using proper format, and attempting in a calm order. These habits, when carried forward, reduce silly mistakes in senior classes.

### **How to analyze mistakes so they don't repeat**

Students often check answers, note the score, and move on. That wastes the most valuable part of practice: analysis. Instead, tag each mistake into one of four categories: concept gap, interpretation error, presentation issue, or time pressure.

For concept gaps, revise the idea and solve 3 similar questions. For interpretation errors, underline command words and rewrite the answer in the required form. For presentation, focus on step-wise writing, headings, and logical flow. For time pressure, practise the same question type with a strict timer until it becomes routine.

### **Choosing the right papers and avoiding low-quality sets**

Random PDFs shared in groups can contain outdated formats or poorly framed questions. You will improve faster if your practice sets follow a consistent blueprint.
